The Many Ways to Celebrate Oktoberfest Little Poland And Alpine Bakery Are Excellent Home Options

There is nothing like the coming change of the season to inspire our favorite fall festival, Oktoberfest.

There are several ways to celebrate this lively occasion. In Contra Costa County, we have three promising Oktoberfest events to enjoy, all on different dates. Why not explore all three?

Walnut Creek Oktoberfest is on September 27 & 28 at Civic Park East. This two-day event, like most, will include live entertainment, music, dancing, gourmet food and dozens of artisan vendors, arts & crafts, a biergarten with dozens of craft beers, wine, international music, and a Kinder Platz Kids Zone.

Crockett Oktoberfest - Sunday, October 13. This is Crockett's 3rd Annual Oktoberfest held at 628 2nd Ave. It is free to attend and offers plenty of unique activities such as axe throwing and a live yodeling contest. Don't forget about the food: Brezen (Pretzels), Würstl (Sausages), Maypole Dance, German Beer & Wine and of course live music and Polka.

Clayton Oktoberfest comes October 5 & 6. It is the most popular and largest of the three Oktoberfests, boasting more visitors (16,000) than Clayton has residents. It features biergarten, Oompah band, live music by The Internationals, authentic German foods, arts and craft, polka dancing, and carnival rides and games for kids. Every effort is made to immerse yourself in Bavarian culture

There are also options to enjoy an Oktoberfest inspired party at home.

Little Poland European Grocery for Authentic Foods

Maybe you don't like crowds. Then bring Oktoberfest into your home. Popular among our local European immigrants is a small grocer at 1984 Monument Blvd. in Concord, called Little Poland

Owner Jacob Gruzynski was well aware of this Concord store offeirng Polish foods at a time when he lived in Livermore. At that time, it was called Ted's Delicatessen. Gruzynski



eventually moved to Concord, bought the store, and changed the name to Little Poland, honoring his native country

That was in 2017. Little Poland is a specialty store which he says there are only two like it in the Bay Area. "There is a large segment of first- and second-generation immigrants who still prefer the products from the Old County, including beer and wine," according to Gruzynski.

Virtually all the products sold at Little Poland are imported from the old world through family heritage companies that distribute foods from Russia, Lithuania, Austria, Bulgaria, Hungary, Romania, Poland, Germany and others.

"Groups from various countries in Europe do not like American foods such as American mayonnaise or ketchup," Gruzynski says. "American sausages and hams are full of water and preservatives. You can find some organics at stores but will pay \$30 or more per pound. It's way different than the foods you get here in the States. Our sausages are better than anywhere else."

I called him on that and it's true. The grillin' sausages have a much better snap with each bite. The seasonings embedded are much more vibrant. The texture seems more compact. They are indeed, delicious.

The point is, try out this quaint import grocer and get sone Old Country meats and other products if you are going to truly experience some Oktoberfest cuisine at home.

And don't' forget the treats. Local bakeries also get in the spirit. Concord's **Alpine Bakery** offers themed cookies, pretzels, black forest cakes, beehives, strudel, Bavarian crème puffs.

If you really wish to get in the Oktoberfest spirit, go authentic. Try your local European imported food store and a bakery.

Domination: There's No End to Amit Elor's Competitive Spirit

There's few who can say at age 20 that they are the best in the world, but Walnut Creek native, Amit Elor, can having walked away with what appears to have been an easy gold medal at the Paris Olympics in the 68kg freestyle women's wrestling division.

Walnut Creek, the County, neighbors, friends, local gyms, schools, all seek to be a part of her success and embrace that connection. Even LeBron James, Steph Curry, and Snoop Dogg had their photos taken individually with Elor.

It wasn't that she won the gold medal, this area has had its share of Olympic medalists. It's that she did it with such mastery. Given the successes in sports of Stanford and UC Berkely

successes in sports of
Stanford and UC Berkely,
the Bay Area has always been mainlining athletes
to the Olympics. In Paris, Central County was well
represented by sending 10 athletes. But not since the
Gold medal performances of Walnut Creek Aquanauts
and Concord's Natalie Coughlin has there been such
local elation over our home-grown champions.

Elor had to drop from her usual wrestling class from 72kg (where she has won eight World Championships in the last three years) to 68kg (about 9 pounds) in order to compete. She entered her bracket as unseeded because she had not won any titles at that weight class. She drew the #1 seed, World Champion from Türkiye, Buse Cavusoglu Tosun. Elor easily won 10-2. Tosun eventually took home the bronze medal. Elor won the rest of her matches, 8-0, 10-0 and was in complete control of her final's opponent from Kyrgyzstan, Meerim Zhumanazarova, despite the lower score of 3-0. Completing a domination over Olympic and World Champion opponents by a combined score of 31-2!

Elor's history of success is equally amazing. In 2018-19, as a freshman at College Park High, she went undefeated winning the CIF State Title. From there she entered home studies through the Mount Diablo Unified School District Horizons independent study program to pursue a higher level of training, which required much traveling across the world.

Today, Elor is virtually invincible. She is on an 83-match win streak, and in National/International competition has only lost once, when she won a bronze medal in Sofia, Bulgaria at U17.

How did she feel about that loss?

"It was my very first
World Championships
competition, Cadet
World 2019. And you
don't know what to
expect except you're
going to try your absolute
best. I did, and I ended
up with a bronze.

"Back then, it wasn't like I had this undefeated win streak that I have now. Of course, I was disappointed by my loss, but it's not the same as if I were to lose right now after such a long win streak

"But being in the wrestling world, we all the time see these upsets happening. We had a bunch of them happen at the

bunch of them happen at the Olympics. Things happen. We can get injured and sick. So, it's pretty cool that I have a win streak, but at the end of the day, we all need to prepare for our competitions because things happen.

"Every single person who was in my bracket was a very excellent wrestler with their own challenges. In general, wrestling is always so much harder than it looks. There's a lot of strength and struggle that happens underneath that you can't see. Sometimes it just looks like people have their hands on each other, but they're constantly using their whole body to fight for position and look for openings and moves and attacks."

What may have been tougher than competing in the Olympics is that Elor returned to the States and had to battle pneumonia. She beat that as well. I spoke with Elor, still nursing a mild cough, while she was on her way to the beach in Southern California. She had traveled there to watch her boyfriend Mica Galvao, a jiu-jitsu world champion, conduct some clinics.

Having won eight World Championships, why are the Olympics more exciting?

"The world championship is the biggest competition within our sport. But the Olympics happens every four years, and the entire world stops what they're doing for two weeks and tunes in to watch all of the best

athletes in the world compete. So, it's 100 times cooler than the world championships because people who are not from the sport of wrestling will tune in and watch wrestling. They'll discover wrestling. The audience and support we receive from the Olympics is day and night difference than the world championships. Many people tell me that they didn't know anything about wrestling and now they're a huge fan of the sport. Just knowing that is so cool to hear."

Elor says her next major wrestling goal is to be a gold medalist at the 2028 Olympics in Los Angeles

Is hosting clinics in your future?

"It's something I've only started recently. My first ones were at the end of 2023, but I really hope to make it more of a profession sharing wrestling, teaching wrestling to kids and youths. I've received a lot of messages

Libraries: Big and small



Concord Friends of the Library, libraries are very special to me. The Concord Library sits at City Hall. I spent many Wednesday mornings with two other volunteers putting books for sale as well as being involved in more than a dozen book

As Mayor in 2018, I donated half the funds of the Mayor's Tournament to the library. When the children's vard area was in need, I arranged for the group "I Love My City" to redo it.

It should be noted that while the city owns the building, the county provides the staff. But the county only provides 35 hours in staff time.

City Council approved funds for additional hours so that it remains open late nights and weekends. They have shared events with the community from learning to play the guitar to knitting and unique reminders of the importance of books such as when I was honored to be asked to read from banned children's books (I read where The Wild Things Are).

The current library is small but bigger than our first library which was a Carnegie Grant library in Todos Santos Plaza. Sadly, generations ago, I recall that the only building knocked down to expand a park was a library

The plans for the Base include a new large library but that is years out. This March, as Mayor along with Vice Mayor Obringer and

Councilmember Aliano, went to Washington D.C. to meet with our Senators to get support for a Federal Grant (sometimes called an Earmark) of \$4,000,000 to expand our existing library.

We gained support of both our state Senators who put it through to the next level in the process where it rests, and we will continue to look for opportunities to expand what

Meanwhile, the community has a library expansion of its own in the form of residential 'little lending libraries.

While most are of the small classic size of a small box with maybe 20 books several have grown quite extensive having multiple levels and shelves. Several of them specialize in children's books and if you contact me with some surplus I can pick them up and distribute

Regardless of being BIG or small, libraries are part of what we call community.

Your Vote Counts

Election season is upon us. Social media has a lot of misinformation circulating that can lead residents to question whether their vote will be counted accurately. Democracy is reliant on voter participation, and misinformation weakens that. I want to ensure you have accurate information on how Contra Costa County Elections (Elections) protects your vote.

First, Elections checks that you **are eligible to vote.** Only eligible people can register to vote, and they sign under penalty of perjury that they meet eligibility requirements. Registration is validated against DMV or Social Security records and if an applicant cannot be validated, they must provide a government-issued photo identification the first time they vote.

Second, Elections makes sure it is you when you vote. Election officials check every ballot return envelope to compare the signature to the voter's signature on file before the ballot can be counted. If the signatures do not

match, or if the signature is missing, election officials contact the voter to cure" their vote-by-mail ballot status. Once the voter's signature is verified, then the ballot can be counted.

Third, Elections checks that you **only vote once**. A voter's activity is logged in the voting history system when they submit their vote-by-mail ballot or vote in person. Safeguards are in place so only one ballot is accepted per voter and only the first ballot received is counted.

Fourth, Elections checks that your ballot is read and properly counted. Contra Costa County's voting system is a paper-based, optical scan ballot system that is tested before and after every election to verify votes are counted and recorded properly Any ballot that cannot be read by the scanners is manually reviewed by a team of two Elections' staff. After Election Day, officials perform a 1% manual hand tally (audit) of the votes to confirm that the voting system accurately tabulated

and reported votes cast for all races.

To summarize, before election results are finalized, election officials ensure that every eligible ballot is counted, that voters only voted once, that all proper procedures were followed, and that the vote tabulation system counted ballots properly. Your vote and identity are checked four times throughout the voting process.

In addition to the multiple system checks, the public can observe all election processes and procedures at the Elections Office and/or Election Operations Center, including the preparation of tabulating devices, vote-by-mail processes, and central count. This ensures

There's a New Cat Rescue in Town

At first glance, the Cat Lounge, which is changing its name to The Cat Chillin' Zone (CCZ), in Martinez is in the business of saving the lives of senior cats. Since they opened their doors in January 2024, they have found homes for fifteen cats. But CCZ is not a typical animal rescue organization. This Harry Potter-themed space contains comfortable couches where patrons can relax while cats curl onto their laps. Besides providing an opportunity to play with cats, they organize many activities to bring animal lovers together. These include a face-painting event every Wednesday, children's birthday parties, karaoke, and trivia nights. Their pasta feed with Alan Skverksy, an executive chef of Wolf Gang Puck, on June 2nd was a huge fundraising success, and they plan to make this an

CCZ has about twenty-five cats available for adoption. Bonded pair, Prince (8 years) and Reeses (11 years), are still in search of their forever homes. They are fast friends and must be adopted together. Both cats are absolute sweethearts. Prince was rubbing against my legs within minutes of my entering the facility. While there has been a lot of interest in adopting only Prince, Reeses has a

benign mass on his face and, although he gets around fine, his front legs are a little wonky (he walks on his elbows). CCZ invites you to come down and meet these two special felines.

Visitations are scheduled Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday between 11 am and 8 pm. Drop-ins welcome, but appointments are encouraged. They are located at 532 Center Avenue in Martinez. Admission is \$20/hour for adults, \$15/hour for military/seniors 62+ and children are free (must be accompanied by an adult, no infants or toddlers).

For those not wanting to adopt, CCZ is looking for volunteers to donate two hours of time once a week. People are needed to transport the cats to the vet, help with routine care and office tasks. They also have an Amazon wish list on their website, and an on-site gift shop, where you can get a copy of Patterson's book, "Whiskers and Wisdom".

CCZ was voted second best nonprofit in Martinez by the Martinez community. As a 501c3 non-profit, they rely on the generosity of adoring cat-a-holics and animal lovers to save as many senior cats as possible from euthanasia. To learn more, visit www. catloungemartinez.com/.

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Behind the Scenes, Clayton Community is Gloria-ous!

Many of us are looking forward to the Clayton Oktoberfest on October 5-6. This event has become one of the premier events in the Bay Area. The downtown festival aims to recreate a real "Munich Style" Oktoberfest with an authentic German biergarten, Oompah band and lots of German food and beer. People arrive from all over the Bay Area costuming traditional German attire, including, men wearing lederhosen.

It is one of two outstanding events organized by the Clayton Business and Community Association (CBCA) that has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars over the years to be awarded back into the community. And while many volunteers make this possible, there is one person who we must recognize was at the forefront of it all, Glora Utley.

If you do not know Gloria, long-time resident of Clayton, you have been living under a rock. Gloria has been an integral part of this community for more than 50 years and has been instrumental in keeping many of the events that we know and love today, continuing.

In 1972, after she and her husband settled in the area, she opened a craft shop in this sleepy village of just 1,400 people.

It was because of her knowledge of juried artists and craftspeople that led to the formation of what we now know of as the Clayton Art- & Wine Festival, which became the main fundraiser for the Clayton Business & Community Association (CBCA).

In 1984, Gloria, then a mother, wife and activist, threw herself into serving this community. She was a principal organizer of the Clayton Roundup, an annual BBQ Kansas-style event on the Easley Estate that by 1996 grew to more than 1200 people in attendance.

In 1997, it was replaced by the Clayton Art & Wine Festival. The Clayton Art & Wine Festival is now a two-day juried event with more than one hundred booths and attracting artists from all over California and attended by thousands of people from all over East Bay. Proceeds from this event fund scholarships and other support for the Clayton community. Gloria, as a founding member of the CBCA, is listed as the Vice Chairman on its constitution documents.

She was a juror at the Art & Wine Festival for several years and has helped double the CBCA professional membership.

In 1984, she became the chair of the 4th of July committee and chuckled recounting the beginnings of the parade

"I was now the chair and proposed that we create and hang a huge banner across Main Street. The idea took off and we excitedly hoisted it up, congratulating ourselves on a job well done. It looked magnificent. But our joy was short lived. Just a short while afterwards, a huge truck lumbered down the street taking our banner with it!"

Also in 1984, she joined the Concord Soroptimists, which lead to launch the Pleasant Hill and Martinez Soroptimists. Eventually, three clubs merged to form Diablo Vista Soroptimists. For 39 years she [Kim Trupiano assisted with this article.]

Indian

I adore Indian food and though I am an adventurous cook, I would rather leave the cooking of this cuisine to the professionals. Indian food is some of the most aromatic and flavorful I have

ever eaten. Indian food's strong flavors make it difficult to pair with wine, however, there a few that can work with classic Indian dishes including creamy Chicken Tikka Masala or any one of the spicy Indian curries.

The first wine style I recommend with Indian food is a medium-bodied (read: 12-13.5% alcohol), fruit forward, off-dry white wine. A little sweetness in the wine is the best way to complement dishes with a spicy heat; highly flavored foods need fruity wines to hold up to their pungent flavors. Look for wines from cool areas like Coastal regions of Northern California, Oregon, Washington, and Germany. German Kabinett Riesling and some Rieslings from the states are good places to start if you like this kind of wine.

The second wine style I recommend is a dry, fruit forward, red wine. It should have good acidity and not be too tannic or alcoholic. Tannins and alcohol increase the perception of spice in a dish and the spice increases the perception of alcohol and tannin in the wine. Each will throw off the other's balance. Grenache based wines from Southern France would work well or lighter style Zinfandels from California.

Forgoing alcohol, the true classic drink with Indian food is Chai Tea. Chai Tea is made with



milk and sugar which will cool the heat from the dishes. As you see in the recipe. below, the spices in the tea are the perfect complement to the classic Masala spice blend: cardamom, cinnamon, coriander, pepper, cumin, and

So, go on. Pair Up!

CHAI TEA

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tablespoon fennel seed 6 green cardamom pods
- 12 whole cloves
- 1 cinnamon stick
- 1 (1/4-inch) piece ginger root, peeled and thinly sliced
- 6 black peppercorns
- 7 cups water
- 2 tablespoons Darjeeling tea 4 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 cup milk

DIRECTIONS

In a medium saucepan, combine fennel seed, cardamom, cloves, cinnamon stick, ginger root, peppercorns and water. Boil for 5 minutes. Remove from the heat and steep for 10 minutes. Add the tea, bring to a boil, reduce the heat, and simmer for 5 minutes.

Strain mixture, discard spices and return the tea to the saucepan. Stir in the brown sugar and milk. Serve immediately.

about setting up clinics all over the place. For now, it's just too much for me.

No one seems to score on you, what's been your toughest match?

"The most I've given up was four points. The start of 2024 has been a huge struggle for me because I had to drop from 72 kilos to 68. My first few competitions at 68kg, I performed poorly even though I won. My performance was poor because my weight cut to 68kg was not done correctly. I would always feel bad and very sluggish. I accumulated little

"In February, I was in the Olympic qualifier in Acapulco. At the start of one of the matches, I got thrown to my back in the beginning of the competition. But after that, I kept accumulating points and ended up winning. I'd say that was probably the worst. Heading into the Olympic trials and the Olympics, things did not seem

very bright because of how much I was struggling.

"It just goes to show that if you

don't give up and keep trying, things can work out. It turns out for me, the preparation for the Olympics was the best that I've ever done. I felt amazing. My body and all the little injuries I had were finally going away. My body was healing. I felt good and energetic.

Elor will not be competing again until 2025, but in the meantime is considering doing some clinics to give back to the community.

If you didn't know Elor, you would think she must just be a beast. But there is a dichotomy of her world dominance over women in wrestling and her youthful, playful persona in everyday life. Growing Winter Vegetables

There is a crispness in the air, which means that Autumn is right around the corner. In Europe and most of the USA, fall is when the growing season ends. But not in Contra Costa. We are blessed with a mild winter climate that allows us to grow and harvest delicious, healthy table vegetables and citrus throughout the winter months. Do you grow fall and winter veggies? You should. Here's how.

Preparation: Make sure that your planting bed has full sun, even in the depths of winter. Shadows lengthen in winter months, and your winter veggie beds should receive at least 6 hours of direct sun each day. Pull out and compost your spent summer plantings and add 1-2 inches of your homemade compost to the bed. Mix compost into the first several inches of existing soil. Have a good supply of mulch available to surround your new winter vegetables with a 2- to 3-inch layer after planting.

Planting: If planting seeds, start them for the first several weeks in a warm, shaded location in small starter pots. Make sure they receive water each day. When the seedlings are 4-6 inches tall, transplant them into their permanent location.
Some seedlings like to be planted deep while others prefer shallow. Read the instructions on the packet or ask your friendly garden center staff. You should plant purchased seedlings within a few days since their roots grow so quickly in starter pots. Leave about 12-16 inches between plants to allow for mature size. If a fall heat spell moves in, you may need to protect your vulnerable seedlings with shade fabric for the first several weeks until their roots have a chance to establish.

Watering and Cold Protection: Assuming a normal Central Contra Costa rainfall season, you will need to irrigate your veggies until about the end of November, or until we receive some soaking rain. After that, only water during prolonged winter dry spells of 3 weeks or more. Many winter veggie varieties can withstand below freezing temperatures, but their growing will slow or stop during the cold. Don't worry though as their growing will pick up again with warmer temperatures. Protect leafy greens (lettuce and spinach) against cold nights with shade cloth or another covering, as they can get frost burned.

Veggie Choices: My favorites for more protected spots in the garden or a greenhouse are lettuce, spinach, Swiss chard, kale, and garlic. Lettuce and spinach will continue to produce new edible leaves until the weather turns hot in












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Around Martinez

My Close Call with the Park Fire is a Lesson for all of Martinez.

I cannot express my gratitude enough to the firefighters who mobilized in the state of California to fight the Park Fire.

My family purchased a cabin in Mill Creek, just south of Lassen National Park, in July 2023. It had been our dream to own a cabin in the mountains and we found the perfect place. We had just celebrated our first anniversary at the cabin with the annual 4th of July community parade (the highlight is the Mineral Women's Kazoo Band!) and supporting the volunteer fire fighters at the annual pancake breakfast fundraiser.

When we locked up and headed back to Martinez, we had every expectation that we would be returning in a few short weeks. But on July 24, an arson in Chico kickstarted a wildfire that within only a few days had grown to hundreds of thousands of acres covering four counties. Our little cabin community of Mill Creek received evacuation orders 24 hours later.

Desperate for information and updates, participation in our community's Facebook group grew tenfold, and active members began posting updates of CalFire briefings and sharing images shared from other fire departments.

Our neighbors recommended we download apps such as "Watch Duty" to be able to track the progress of the fire, evacuation orders, and updates from the Genasys system (formerly Zonehaven).

CalFire had daily briefings, and everyone who had been evacuated checked hourly on the status of the lands they hold so dear. We were notified, as the fire crept up the Mill Valley canyon, that firefighters were setting backfires to protect communities like ours to reduce the impact when the fire came through.

We received kudos for clearing the forest floor around our cabins and creating defensible spaces. Butte County Fire Department posted photos of firetrucks on our roads, undergrowth ablaze, and thick smoke in the trees that we recognized; we all held our breath. When the evacuation orders for our Genasys district were lifted on August 17, all of the cabins in Mill Creek and surrounding communities had been successfully protected. My family gave a

huge sigh of relief.

Thirty days after the fire first started, it is still only 71% contained and has reached 430,000 acres, making it the 4th largest wildfire in the history of California. Fire departments from all over the region reported to protect our northern California communities, totaling over 2,500 personnel, five helicopters, 66 engines, 72 dozers, and 118 water tenders.

Although all of the cabins in the Mill Creek and Mineral communities were saved, across the entire extent of the fire, 637 structures were destroyed. My heart goes out to these families who lost their homes, or their retirements, or their dream of rural mountain living. But the most important statistic is that there were no fatalities or injuries to fire personnel or civilians. I commend the CalFire leadership for protecting the lives of both civilians and their staff.

Just a few Diablo Gazette issues ago, I wrote an article about wildfire preparedness, creating defensible space around your home, and emergency alerts. Experiencing a near miss with a major fire like this makes me realize how very poignant the information in that article

As the mayor of Martinez, I commit to continuing to work with our fire departments and emergency personnel to do whatever we can to prepare for, and actively prevent, wildfires in Martinez.

My heartfelt appreciation goes out to everyone who mobilized to protect the many rural communities from the Park Fire. Thank you!

National Night Out Martinez returned August 6, at the Waterfront Park for the second year since the Covid outbreak. Before Covid from 2015 to 2019, the events were hosted at the Alhambra Christmas Tree Farm in Martinez. More than 900 were in attendance this year, which is double the attendance of the first Alhambra Valley event in 2015.

"We have expanded the Alhambra Valley event from a neighborhood gathering to a city-wide celebration under the National Night Out Martinez organization. Our location at the Martinez Waterfront Park allows room for more attendees and exhibitors as well as including and integrating other smaller local National Night Out groups to participate," said event organizer Pete Sabine in a statement.

The event also attracted a few attendees from nearby communities.

It was the culmination of just over nine months of planning from a six-person team of organizers. The team consisted of Christine Dean, a former member of the Contra Costa County Office of the Sheriff, Irene Merkel with the Martinez Chamber of Commerce, Cliff Chan with Martinez CERT as well as Kevin Murray, Steve Riccobono, and Pete Sabine.

Participants, Sponsors, and Volunteers Coordinate Support

The organizing team enlisted the support of the Chief of Police, Mayor of Martinez, City Manager and City Council Members. Plus, it obtained the endorsement of the Martinez Chamber of Commerce and the Martinez Downtown Association.

The City of Martinez provided a grant of \$5,000 to apply toward the event expenses (which was over \$10,000) as the primary sponsorship of the event. The balance of the event expenses was covered by additional sponsors, including MCE Clean Energy, Les Schwab Tires, Nuvision Credit Union, Pete Sabine Real Estate, Martinez Music Mafia and donations from Republic Services and Bill's Ace Hardware.

Free Child ID kits were distributed to attendees by Pete Sabine. Several local security companies displayed their wares including ADT, one of the national sponsors of National Night Out.

Also at the event were six area First Responder agencies who brought their police vehicles, ambulance and fire trucks to the location. This included participation from Consolidated Fire, American Medical Response, Martinez Police Department, California Highway Patrol, and the Contra Costa County Office of the Sheriff. The Martinez Police Department brought two motorcycles to the event, much to the glee of the children.

The Contra Costa County Office of the Sheriff Search and Rescue provided a vehicle display at the event as well as with packets of information which included information concerning crime prevention specifically for children, as well as a Junior Sheriff sticker and a temporary tattoo of a Sheriff's badge.

Local Office Races

There will be only one competitive City Council race, for the District 2 seat currently occupied by longtime incumbent Mark Ross. Because of redistricting, Ross no longer lives in the district and was ineligible to run for re-election.

The race for Ross' seat is between longtime Martinez Parks, Recreation, Marina and Cultural Commission Chairperson Dylan Radke (who previously ran for City Council in 2012) and Greg Young, a consumer protection commissioner with the state Department of Financial Protection and Innovation. Candidates' packets can be read Online at CityofMartinez.org.

In District 3, incumbent Satinder Malhi was the only candidate to file papers to run and will automatically earn a full four-year term.

Martinez Unified School District Board of Trustees

Although three seats are up for election, there will be only one competitive race for the school board, in Area 1 between incumbent Carlos Melendez and Logan Campbell. Melendez was appointed to fill the seat in 2021 when incumbent Jonathan Wright resigned after defeating Melendez in the 2020 race. Campbell, a small business owner and community activist, was an applicant for the vacant City Council seat that went to Malhi in 2023.

Incumbents Anne Horack Martin in Area 2 and Courtney Masella-O'Brien in Area 4 were the only candidates to file to run for those seats and will be automatically elected to new four-year terms.

Didi (IzzacWang) is a 13-year-old Taiwanese American boy living in Fremont, California in 2008. In the summer before he is about to begin high school, he spends his days playing video games, goofing around with friends and trying to get closer to his crush.

With his father constantly away on business in Taiwan, Didi is surrounded by a house full of women. He fights with his older sister Vivian (Shirley Chen), enjoys time with his grandma Nai Nai (Zhang Li Hua) and has a tense relationship with his mother Chungsing (Joan Chen).

The title character goes by several names. Online and to his friends, he is Wang Wang. Attempting to broaden his friend circle with some older skater boys, he introduces himself as Chris. And he goes by Didi within his family. The names he chooses show how he begins to try on different personas and tailor himself to fit what he thinks others want to see and who he hopes to become.

The depiction of boys at this age is authentic. Didi and his friends curse a lot, have questionable exploits and behave in a disrespectful and annoying fashion. These are not kids out of control; they merely make stupid mistakes and push their boundaries like all teenagers. As Didi and his friends struggle to cultivate a veneer of cool, they seek to navigate the world of girls, friendships, and the realization that school will need to be taken more seriously.

Where this could simply be a story about embarking on the tumultuous years of being a teenager, the film goes a step further and dives into how difficult and confusing it is to raise teenagers. Although we mostly follow Didi's trajectory, a substantial portion is also devoted to

his mother. It is interesting to see one character try to find their place in the world, while another reflects on how their life choices put them somewhere they did not expect to be. There are touching mother and son moments that many parents will be able to relate to.

This film will invariably draw comparisons to 2018's "Eighth Grade," where we follow a teenage girl during the same time of adolescence. They make great companion pieces, illustrating different perspectives of finding a way to steer through an emotionally charged time of life. Younger viewers will feel seen, while adults will most likely be glad this time of life is in their rearview mirror.

The Instigators

Mr. Besegai (Michael Stuhlbarg) is a mid-level crime boss who needs three crooks to help him rob the mayor of Boston. Finding himself shorthanded for the heist, he allows one of his regular delinquents, Scalvo (Jack Harlow), to bring on the two new guys.

Scalvo recruits the fast-talking, know-it-all Cobby (Casey Affleck) and the inexperienced, but desperate for money, Rory (Matt Damon). When the heist does not go as planned, Rory and Cobby are left holding the bag and stuck with each other until they can figure a way out of the mess.

The guys bicker as they traverse through Boston, trying to salvage their botched job while creating newer and bigger problems along the way. At one point, Rory enlists his therapist to help and ends up dragging her into their mounting problems. Hong Chau, as Dr. Donna Rivera, showcases her capability of elevating any film she is in and holds her own in the heavy action scenes.

Do not look for an intricate plot or backstory. The characters are not fleshed out and you need to accept that you are simply here for the ride. This film relies heavily on the likability of its actors. Casey Affleck is humorous and Matt Damon is relatable as a regular guy driven to desperate measures. They have an enjoyable onscreen rapport as two people forced to work together due to their circumstances.

The cast is top-notch with Ron Perlman as the corrupt mayor and Ving Rhames as one scary cop who will stop at nothing to complete his assignment. Both seem to relish their over-the-top roles, as do the rest of the cast. The plot attempts to say something about moral choices and how easily power can lead to corruption, but it does not get too heavy-handed.

If you can accept this film as pure entertainment, and you enjoy big explosions and long car chases, then you can expect to have a satisfying good time. Stay through the credits to make sure you get the update on a couple of characters.

Since the Bay Area is having a summer covid surge, it seemed appropriate to review a novel that takes place during the lockdown. "56 Days" (Blackstone Publishing, paperback, 320 pages, \$10.39) by Catherine Ryan Howard is a suspenseful psychological thriller set in Dublin, Ireland during the early days of the pandemic.

Throughout the novel, Howard does an excellent job of planting questions in reader's minds. Is main character, Ciara, a naïve romantic? Is debonair Oliver who he presents himself to be, or does the secret he harbors hold the key to his true colors? The narrative jumps between the point of view of these two characters starting on the day they met in a supermarket and moving around in various time sequences. Scenes in current time are also depicted by Detective Leah Riordan as she tries to sort out the identity of a decomposing body in a bathtub.

Thirty-five days after Ciara and Oliver meet and begin dating, Ireland goes into lockdown. Ciara takes a leap of faith and moves in with Oliver. The stakes are high because Ciara may have made a critical error by not letting her family know her whereabouts. When a journalist warns Ciara to be careful of Oliver, and as readers ponder why Oliver fled London, the tension skyrockets. As clues unfold and Oliver and Ciara's relationship deepens, readers are left wondering what happened on day 56.

I highly recommend picking up this novel, even if you cringe at the thought of being reminded of those days we all spent in lock-

down. The tight tension and twisty plot of this page turner will make you forget that you were a part of these dark days of the global pandemic. The story is told in various time periods, so readers who are not fond of this storytelling approach may not appreciate the intricacies of this tale. However, if you love a good

who-dun-it that will leave you guessing about the character's motivations, then this is the book for you.

Residents should not approach or touch calves, attempt to take selfies with them, allow their dogs near them or get between them and their mothers. Interactions with calves can be a danger to both people and grazing animals, according to the Park District.

Residents should not worry if they see a calf by itself, as its mother is usually nearby. However, if a calf appears to be in significant distress or injured, sick, or dead, it should be reported to park staff at (510) 881-1833. Reports should include the location, color and ear tag number of the animal, if possible.

Grazing animals are part of the regional ecosystem and have been for tens of thousands of years, the Park District said. Conservation grazing is still used to maintain a healthy ecosystem for native plants and wildlife, while reducing wildfire risks.

Good nutrition, regular exercise, and good sleep obviously will help you stay healthy, but it may always feel like you are swimming upstream if your inner monologue is tearing you down.

The way that you talk to yourself matters immensely to your health. It impacts the way that you move, how clearly you think, and how much energy you have available. Why? Your brain prioritizes

safety. The safer brain feels, the more it will let you come out and play. If your brain doesn't like your tone, it will do whatever it can to keep you safe — even if the "danger" is coming from your own internal monologue

But don't take my word for it, test

Do some kind of movement such as reach for your toes, check your balance, check the tension levels in your neck (Do not move into pain as that will skew the "data"). Any type of movement will do. Do a few reps to make sure you are as warmed up as possible.

Then try on some different tones

talk to

Positive Self-

of self-talk and see how it impacts your movement.

If your movement improves, it means your brain feels safer and is willing to take off the brakes.

If your movement declines, it means your brain feels threatened by the words or tone you have used and will shut down your movement in an attempt to keep you safe.

The majority of people benefit from nurturing self-talk. But your brain may prefer a more direct, matter-of-fact tone. Or you may be a Positive Pessimist. False praise may

actually feel threatening to you.

What matters is that you are talking to yourself in the way your brain feels

safe. Give it a try and see what you notice.




